Montana State University's College of Nursing has received a <u>grant totaling nearly \$2.8 million</u> that will enable the university and its partners across Montana to address the need for nurses in shortage areas across the state, particularly in rural areas.

A relatively new partnership between the Montana banking community and the Jake Jabs College of Business and Entrepreneurship is working to prepare students for careers in community banking.

MSU's <u>Regional Pulse Crop Diagnostic Laboratory</u> helps Montana farmers identify issues with their pulse crops, which include peas, chickpeas and lentils. Montana's pulse-planted land has more than doubled since 2014 to nearly 1.5 million acres.

More than a dozen <u>students from tribal colleges around the state</u> spent a week at MSU conducting research and learning about the services and resources available on campus to help them succeed.

<u>Angella Ahn has been appointed to Montana Arts Council</u> by Gov. Steve Bullock. Ahn, assistant professor in the School of Music, and an internationally recognized musician who teaches violin and viola, will serve a five-year term on the 15-member council.

Dozens of high school seniors from across the state of Montana have been selected for their effort and potential as the third class of <u>MSU's Hilleman Scholars Program</u>, named after Maurice Hilleman, one of the state's most influential, but least known, native sons.

High school students from across the state took part in the <u>Montana Summer Startup Academy at MSU</u>, a new program that helps high schoolers interested in entrepreneurship.

MSU has been recognized on a <u>list</u> of the top colleges or universities in each state where alumni are <u>most likely to land</u> <u>jobs</u>. Zippia put together a new list of the schools in each state with the best record of helping their graduates get jobs after graduation.

MSU senior leadership visited northeastern Montana as part of the <u>seventh annual MSU Bus Tour</u>, with stops in Fort Peck, Froid, Glasgow, Jordan, Lewistown, Malta, Plentywood, Poplar, Sand Springs and Scobey.

MSU celebrated the grand opening of Rendezvous Dining Pavilion. The 30,000-square-foot facility has seating for 830 and will serve thousands of meals per day to students, faculty, staff and community members.

The incoming freshman class celebrated their MSU beginning at <u>Convocation</u> featuring a lecture titled "What IS the Right thing to do" by Harvard Professor, Michael Sandel.

MSU welcomed a freshman class of more than 3000 students with a full suite of events as part of MSU Debut. <u>MSU</u> <u>Debut</u> provides opportunities for students to connect with other incoming students, returning students, faculty, and staff who will be a part of their academic journey through graduation.
