ITEM 122-2006-R0304

<u>Authorization to Increase Mandatory Fees, Miscellaneous and Course Fees, and Auxiliary Fees for FY05; Montana State University-Bozeman</u>

THAT:

The Board of Regents of Higher Education authorizes MSU-Bozeman to increase the following select set of mandatory fees, miscellaneous and course fees, and auxiliary fees for FY05.

EXPLANATION:

- 1. At the request of the Chair of the Board of Regents, the Commissioner of Higher Education directed (on February 12, 2004) all campuses of the Montana University System to submit all Asignificant fee changes@for approval in March rather than May. A significant fee change was defined as one which meets one of the following conditions:
 - a. An increase of \$15 per year per FTE for a single fee;
 - b. An increase of over 3% for any single fee; or,
 - c. Any new fee.
- 2. The attached document presents all Asignificant fee changes@ proposed by MSU-Bozeman, for Board of Regents approval.

This \$1.20 increase is an inflationary adjustment that will go towards maintaining the current level of "buying power" for this revenue stream. Access to specialized equipment in classrooms and student labs is an important element in the high quality of instruction MSU provides its students. This increase will allow us to maintain the caliber of equipment that attracts high ability students and non-resident students and, in some cases, provides service to Montana businesses.

Athletic Fee	49.25	56.75	15.23%	As part of a 5-year budget plan, a schedule for increasing the athletic fee by \$7.50 per semester, through Fiscal Year 2006, was approved by the Board of Regents in 2002. This fee is pledged to athletic scholarships. MSU services 15 sports and an average of 280 student-athletes annually. Of these 280 student-athletes, 110 are on full-scholarship, with an additional 99 on partial scholarship. On the average, 70 to 80 students-athletes annually do not receive scholarships and support the University with approximately \$1,000,000 in education costs. Athletics also supports the University financially through payment of administrative fees and the use of auxiliary services. Additionally, Athletics contributes to enrollment management by recruiting, providing financial aid, and retaining students to graduation rates that exceeds the University as a whole. In keeping with the excellent academic reputation of the overall student body, MSU student-athletes, whose current all-sport combined GPA is 3.10, have ranked first in total Academic All-Big Sky Conference selections since 1976 and are also number one in NCAA post-graduate scholarship selections.

COURSE/PROGRAM FEE RATIONALE

All of the proposed course/program fee increases shown on the following pages have a similar rationale for the increase shown as well as comparable student input mechanisms. In each course/program listed, academic units are incurring additional costs due to inflationary factors, increased consumable materials expended, programmatic enhancements (e.g., expanded field trip experiences), and/or increase in specialized instruction at the course/program level. Proposed increases will help maintain or enhance quality by providing the most appropriate level of equipment and/or services to meet educational objectives.

A decentralized method exists for soliciting and considering student input as part of the fee proposal process. Typically, the head of each academic department or program will first discuss the proposed increase with departmental student organization representatives, or all students directly affected by the fee, and seek their endorsement. A presentation of all proposed course/program fees is then made to the ASMSU Student Senate.

The cost of a Parking Ticket, in comparison to the price of a vehicle registration (\$126), has declined considerably over the past several years since the current \$10 rate was established; and, the relative "value" of ten dollars has deflated over time. As a result, for many people the "deterrent power" related to the risk of receiving a parking ticket has declined considerably over the past 10-15 years. The objective of this proposed increase is not to increase revenues, but to increase the overall level of compliance with campus parking regulations. A reduction in the number of commuters who park inappropriately will directly enhance the quality of our Parking Program for all others.

Degree Application (Graduation) Fee	30.00	45.00	50.0%	Historically, MSU has provided a meaningful Commencement ceremony as a culmination of a student's academic career which allows the institution to celebrate that accomplishment with the graduate, his/her family and friends. In an effort for a more personal recognition of our baccalaureate degree candidates, MSU began individual college ceremonies in 1985 rather than recognize those graduates at the Main ceremony. While successful in enhancing the Commencement experience, it has also increased the overall cost of the event. Revenue generated by the existing degree application fee has not kept pace with the costs of official diplomas and expenses of a Main and individual college ceremonies. Funds not designated for Commencement expenditures have been used for the shortfall, thus reducing services in other areas of Student Affairs & Services. With this requested fee increase, we can continue to provide a memorable, well-planned Commencement occasion for graduates, families, friends, faculty and the University.

					The University currently pays a fee of about 1.80% of each transaction amount on every credit card payment. The University's FY04 General Operating costs for credit card fees will total about \$360,000. This will increase to nearly \$400,000 in FY05.
					This E-Payment Fee will recover about half the University's cost of credit card fees for the transactions processed on-line.
					The State of Montana charges 2% of the payment, plus \$1.25, for all on-line Fish & Game transactions. The University of Montana charges \$10 for all credit card transactions on payments of \$150 or more. Oregon State and University of Washington charge \$40 for all transactions of payments over \$150.
					This fee will allow MSU to extend a popular, and often expected, convenience to students and parents, and to recover a portion of the University's costs for dong so, rather than absorbing all added costs of the service into the General Operations budget.
