Under Senate Bill 425, the Board of Regents was designated as the eligible agency for the management of Perkins funds. The State Plan Advisory Committee, required by SB 425, serves to make recommendations and/or provide key information and materials to the Board of Regents in regard to the use of Perkins funds to support K-16 career and technical education.
